Pandas: Our Pandas are reading "The Best Christmas Pageant Ever" by Barbara Robinson. They will also participate in Pinnacle's "A Night at the Theater". have selected a very short, very humorous play entitled "Twas the Day Before Winter Break". I'm so excited to see them perform on stage!

We finished our novel study on The Miraculous Journey of Edward Tulane. In December our Lions will be working on their final project that will be displayed during Parent-Teacher Conferences. Giraffes: In December, we will be using Olive the Other Reindeer as our main literary focus.

Lions are working on a dream vacation project. They will use the skills they learned during the semester by creating a budget to travel to their dream destination.



Math

Tigers: Tigers are working on probability, compound events, permutation, and combinations. Next, they will start working on Data and Statistics, in which they will learn to analyze data using different types of graphs. Some of the tigers worked on sequences, in which they are learnt to find the nth terms of the sequence using either arithmetic or geometric sequence and are now working on angle relationships and polygons. Few of the students also worked on percent in which they learnt converting between fractions, percent, and decimals. The Tigers are working on creating a dream home project in which they will design their dream home, calculate area, and create a budget on the final cost of the home.

Giraffes: Giraffes worked on to record the survey results using different types of graphs (like Bar graphs, pictographs, line graphs ..) and answer related questions by reading the graphs. Giraffes are now working on projects using different shapes. They are also working on a marshmallow project in which they will focus on measurements and fact families using marshmallows. We will continue to work on math facts.

Lions: Lions worked on to learn equivalent fractions, finding the L.C.M and G.C.F. of given numbers, adding and subtracting fractions and mixed numbers with like and unlike denominators, improper fractions. They will continue to learn finding part of number, and probability. Some of the lions worked on analyzing data and statistics, using different types of graphs (line graphs, bar graphs and histogram), find the mean, median, mode and range. Lions are now working on a dream vacation project in which they will create a budget to travel to their dream destination. **Pandas:** Pandas had fun learning to take different surveys and record the results using tally marks and using different types of graphs (like Bar graphs, picto graphs, line graphs) and answer related questions by reading the graphs. They also learnt about the different 2D and 3D shapes. Pandas also worked on fractions, in which they learnt identifying numerator, denominator, find the equivalent fractions, and order fractions from least to greatest and greatest to least. They are now working on a project using fractions and another project on shapes. We will continue to work on math facts.

As with the Lions, all students should be close to memorizing lines, and we will be shifting focus to our play preparation full time. Their play is called *What the Dickens*. Their tale explains the difficulty for spreading a message of Christmas spirit in a world that has become technology based and much more dangerous for ghosts. This version of *A Christmas Carol* may not be exactly *classical*, but it should be interesting. The performances for both plays will be the evening of Thursday December 16th.
