REMIND 101 is our preferred method of communication for everyday activities and reminders.



Lions (Math):

In January, we completed a mid-year assessment and I'm very pleased with the progress in their mathematical thinking. In February, we will begin our unit on FRACTIONS...You can count on lots of critical thinking, real-world applications, and word problems!

Lions (ELA):

This second semester has begun with a rocky start...due to lots of absences, going back/forth from in-person learning to online (and understandably so—Thank you for keeping your child home if they are not well!), we are behind schedule...But that's OK because I have modified my lesson plans and made several adjustments so that we can finally finish MJET, and not sacrifice the learning objectives.

- We have finished the lapbook portion of MJET.
- I changed the writing project to ONE paper focusing on SYMBOLISM. The students SHOULD HAVE completed the 5-paragraph rough draft (Introduction, 3 body, and conclusion) in class with me.
- We will also begin our new novel study on Monday, January 31....The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe by C.S. Lewis...please make sure your child has this book by Monday!

Math

Tigers: **Tigers** worked on probability, permutations and combinations. They are now working on Geometry, in which kids are angles of trianales workina on quadrilaterals, angles of polygons, circles, congruent and similar figures. Some of the tigers completed working on solving linear equations in which they learnt single and multi- step equations and inequalities using different operations. Few of the students will worked on metric measurements in which they learnt to relate and compare different types of metric units compute different time zones and problem-solving applications. They are now working on decimals, in which kids will learn to solve different operations on decimals. Some of the tigers are working on Matrices, in which they will learn to add, subtract multiply and divide using matrices.

Giraffes: Giraffes did a wonderful job learning fractions, in which they learnt to identify and learn fractions. We will be working on Measurements in which kids will learn measuring length using cms, and inches), capacity and volume. They are working on learning metric units conversions. Kids will learn converting between cups, pints and quarts, ounces and pounds, grams and kilograms.

Lions: Lions will be working on Geometry in which they will learn points, lines, ray, and line segment, angles parallel and perpendicular lines. They will also work on circles and different types of polygons. Difference between similar and congruent figures and transformations. Some of the lions are working on decimals, in which they will be learning to solve decimal problems using different math operations.

Pandas: Pandas will be working on Measurements in which kids will learn measuring length to the nearest (cms, and inches), capacity (ounces and pounds), and volume. They are working on learning metric units conversions. Kids will learn converting between (cups, pints and quarts) (ounces and pounds), (grams and kilograms). Kids are also working on Gallon Man and Times tables.



Upper Humanities

We will be exploring these as we continue our social studies work in class. In January we laid the foundation for societies and types of governments, now each class will branch in exploring different areas of world and American history.

Lions:


Our study of ancient Greece is going to the next level as we examine the significant political influences that shaped Western civilization. The great philosophical legacy of Socrates, Plato, and Aristotle with the great military conflict between Greece and Persia all shape the world that exists today. Interspersed in this history is a study of the very first public speakers and the emergence of rhetoric as a discipline. Very soon the class will start a project that takes them across ancient Sicily as they learn and employ the basics of public speaking. As our school year progresses, we will add to this understanding the great cultures of Eastern Asia and the Middle East to provide full historical context.

Tigers:

We have spoken and debated as a regular part of instruction, now in ELAR we are writing specifically for the purpose of speaking. In the last few weeks, we have examined and exercised the elements of communication and are now preparing our very first formal speech to inform. The ability to speak clearly and convincingly is often the difference maker for success. Understanding the needs, we all share is a critical lesson for analyzing audiences and crafting the effective messages. Additionally, we will be starting our next novel, *The Lord of the Flies*, by William Golding, very soon.

In History We are looking at the development of the original colonies into the United States, having just completed our study of the causes and events of the American Revolution. Study of the early nation will also bring an analysis of the U.S. constitution and the balance of power that drive our political actions today. We have had some very invigorating conversations in class, and I'm looking forward to our next debates as students will hold their own constitutional convention to see if they can improve over the founders.

Science

All Pinnacle Prep School students (except PreK) spent much of January learning coding in science class. We will continue introducing code projects over the remainder of the school year, adding some robotics as well.

There are many reasons students should learn to code. Most of these justifications have nothing to do with a future occupation. Coding teaches problem-solving, computational thinking, attention to detail, executive functioning, and teamwork. "As a result, kids build their self-confidence, discover the excitement of learning a new skill and experience the thrill of building something from scratch. These are all valuable skills for any future career and for life in general." (26 Reasons Why Kids Should Learn to Code)

Having logical thinking skills encourages kids to think for themselves, question assumptions, develop their own theories, and test theories against known facts. These thinking skills are transferable to all situations, especially science.
