Penguins:

The Penguins continue to work very hard!

- Please remember how important it is for your child to read TO YOU—Kinder/1st grade/2nd grade books, depending on your child's ability level...I have plenty of books to share if you need suggestions!
- We are emphasizing handwriting this semester...we are using the D'Nealian style since this will make the transition to cursive a very logical progression in the future...your child is already expected to be able to write his/her name and the "lowercase small letters" of the alphabet: a,c,e,i,m,n,o,r,s,u,v,w,x and z, AND NOW they also know the "tall lowercase letters": b,d,f,h,k,l,t !!! Our last section will be the "descending letters": g, j,p,q and y...
- Work Stations will continue after daily handwriting, reading, & sight word work is done...It's so exciting! The Penguins have demonstrated that I can trust them to work with partners doing puzzles, magnet letters, coloring, reading, rainbow words, and so many more... this allows me more 1:1 time with each kiddo to hear them read to me, check sight word progress, and monitor handwriting—FUN!
- Reading Log (M-Th), Please read with your child a minimum of 20 minutes each day, and initial the reading log in their purple folders.
- Treasure Chest will be every Friday...ONLY for those students who have completed reading homework (including reading log) & class work ON TIME
- Please continue to practice SIGHT WORDS EVERYDAY with your child...The expectation is to know the word within 3 seconds without sounding them out...these words don't always follow the rules, that's why students have to know them simply by sight. Students should already have mastered the Kinder (Primer) list and moved on to the First Grade list...I even have some students on the Second Grade list, hooray!

Math

Penguins:

Penguins did a great job working on addition and subtraction using a number line, and are currently practicing finding missing addends in equations through the same method. Their next focus will be on financial literacy, where they will learn to identify and count different types of coins. We will also continue to reinforce their fluency in addition and subtraction facts.

Giraffes:

Giraffes made great strides in mastering the concept of elapsed time,

which involves calculating the difference between start and end times. They have now shifted their focus to data and graphing, which involves conducting surveys, creating tally marks, and constructing different types of graphs such as bar graphs and pictographs, while also answering related questions. The children will soon commence their studies on multiplication. We will continue to work on math facts.

Pandas:

Pandas are currently studying geometry, including the identification of various types of lines, such as lines, line segments, and rays, as well as the recognition of intersecting, perpendicular, and parallel lines. They are also learning about different types of polygons and how to classify triangles based on their sides and angles. Furthermore, they will begin working on the computation of the area and perimeter of various polygons. Additionally, the pandas will practice multiplying two-digit numbers by two-digit numbers and continue to refine their skills in long divisions.

Lions:

Lions have completed their study of graphing techniques, which included line plots, histograms, line graphs, and circle graphs. They focused are now on decimals, value which involves decimal place and operations such as addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division using decimals. Next, they will move into geometry. Some of the children are also learning about percents, which entails understanding the relationship between fractions, decimals, and percents, converting between them, finding the percent of a number, ultimately applying problem-solving strategies using percents.

Tigers:

Tigers have successfully completed their study of data analysis and probability, which included topics such as permutation, combinations, and probability of independent and dependent events. They have now shifted their focus to studying polynomials and non-linear functions. This includes topics like adding, subtracting, multiplying, and dividing monomials and polynomials, as well as the rules of exponents, negative and zero exponents, and scientific notation. Additionally, they are studying linear functions, which cover linear equations in two variables, slope of a line, slope-intercept form, function notation, and solving and graphing systems of linear equations. Soon, they will begin exploring rational numbers and equations, which involve adding, will subtracting, multiplying, and dividing fractions with variables.
