 Please make sure to continue to practice D'Nealian style handwriting over the summer! Work Stations will continue after daily handwriting, reading, & sight word work is done...It's so exciting! The Penguins have demonstrated that I can trust them to work with partners doing puzzles, magnet letters, coloring, reading, rainbow words, and so many more... this allows me more 1:1 time with each kiddo to hear them read to me, check sight word progress, and monitor handwriting—FUN! Only 3 more weeks of Reading Log this year! (M-Th), Please continue to read WITH your child a minimum of 20 minutes each day over the summer...this is crucial to your child's smooth transition to first grade and will prevent the dreaded "summer slide", aka REGRESSION!  Thank you for practicing SIGHT WORDS EVERYDAY with your child...The expectation is to know the word within 3 seconds without sounding them out...these words don't always follow the rules, that's why students have to know them simply by sight. Students should already have mastered the Kinder (Primer) list and moved on to the First Grade list...I even have some students on the Second Grade list, hooray! I adore these sweet Penguins, and look forward to having them for a full hour next year! Thank you, again, for your support and partnership in education from home!

Math Ms. Jaya

Penguins:

The Penguins have been working on identifying different types of coins and learning their respective values. They also worked on counting, creating tallies, and graphing them. Currently, they are focusing on recognizing the place and value of digits in larger numbers. Going forward, the class will continue to work on finding missing addends, as well as addition and subtraction facts up to 20.

Giraffes:

The Giraffes have completed a unit on data and graphing, where they learned how to conduct surveys, create tally marks, and construct various types of graphs, including bar graphs and pictographs. They were also required to answer questions related to the data presented in the graphs. Currently, they are working on memorizing the times tables, having already mastered the 2- and 3-times tables. The focus going forward will be on mastering the rest of the times tables. Furthermore, the class will continue to work on math facts.

Pandas:

The Pandas have successfully completed a unit on geometry that covered different types of lines, line segments, and rays. They also learned about various types of polygons and how to classify triangles based on their sides and angles. Currently, they are working on finding the perimeter and area of squares, rectangles, and triangles, and will continue to learn how to find the volume of cubes and rectangular prisms. Additionally, they are working on graphing. The Pandas will also continue to focus on multiplying and dividing larger numbers in their math studies.

Lions:

The Lions recently completed a unit on probability and statistics, during which they learned about tree diagrams, dependent and independent events, and finding measures of central tendency such as mean, median, mode, and range. Currently, they are working on graphing and will learn to plot different types of graphs such as line plots and line graphs. Additionally, some of the Lions are working on geometry, specifically identifying different types of angles, polygons, and congruent and similar figures. They will continue to work on finding the area and perimeter of different polygons, as well as the area and circumference of circles.

Tigers:

The Tigers have successfully completed their study of polynomials and non-linear functions, which involved learning how to add, subtract, multiply, and divide monomials and polynomials. Currently, they are studying the rules of exponents, including negative and zero exponents, and scientific notation. Their upcoming topics include quadratic functions, exponential growth, and decay. Meanwhile, some of the tigers are focusing on the unit of real numbers and right triangles. They will be covering concepts such as square roots, simplifying square roots, the Pythagorean theorem, and the distance and midpoint formulas. Others are working on rational numbers and equations, specifically learning how to add, subtract, multiply, and divide fractions with variables.

Science

Why do we teach geography in science class? Geography is taught in schools for various reasons. One reason is that it helps students understand the world around them - including how the Earth is continually reformed. "It also helps them understand the interrelationships between people and the environment. Additionally, geography helps students develop critical thinking and problem-solving skills." ~GoGreenva.org

Our Penguins and Giraffes learned about the seven continents, five oceans, and the equator. The Pandas, Lions, and Tigers reviewed continents, oceans, latitudes, longitude, time zones, and states. Lions and Tigers added state capitals, physical features, and landmarks. Tigers are working on learning the location of select countries on each continent.



Looking ahead: Pandas, Lions, and Tigers will do body system projects in the coming weeks.

Pandas:

Students will be divided into groups to create a 3D model of an amusement park that represents their assigned system of the human body— circulatory, respiratory, nervous, digestive, muscular, or skeletal. The amusement park model must describe how it relates to the body system and its parts.

Lions and Tigers:

Each student will create a model of a ride (or game) representing one of the body systems. Each student will develop a portfolio explaining how the system is integrated into the body.

Groups build their amusement park in class and present to the class showcasing their specific system. They are encouraged to bring recycled items from home, such as recycled plastics, cardboard, paper, blocks, Legos, clay, wire, fabric, etc. The base should be approximately 60 cm by 60 cm (or larger).

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
