# **ELA**

#### Mrs. Hill

Giraffes: 🦒

- READING & SIGHT WORD LOGS: Parents please remember to each sign each log DAILY M-Thurs. This confirms that your child has spent 20 minutes reading & 10 minutes practicing sight words. I will assess each student's progress on sight words every Friday...Reading must be done with your child—I encourage you to read to your child...UNTIL...as your kiddo builds his or her phonemic skills, I will let you know when it's educationally appropriate to move to shared reading. It is my ultimate goal for your child to become an independent, fluent reader, all on their own. Remember, comprehension is KEY! Owl Bucks will be fined when work is incomplete or planner is not signed... ○
- Please help me reinforce the concept of STRETCHING out words..."Get your mouth ready to say the first SOUND, then STRETCH each sound until the word is done. Then say the word FAST!"
- READING: Our focus for March will be St. Patrick's Day, and springtime.
- WRITING...Each day, the Giraffes will write sentences about the story we are reading. I want to see them sounding & stretching out the words phonetically (also called "invented spelling"). I will be monitoring and working with each student to help them according to his or her educational needs.
- PHONICS & SOUNDS: Students are responsible for completing two pages daily in their Abeka workbook to reinforce concepts previously taught in class.
- Please help me to encourage proper letter formations and forming/reading complete sentences.
- Coloring, Cutting, and Pasting will be ongoing skills that we practice to get our fine-motor skills STRONG so that handwriting becomes easier for your child.

#### Pandas:

- READING & SIGHT WORD LOGS: Parents, please remember to sign BOTH logs DAILY M-Thurs. This confirms that your child has spent 20 minutes of reading & 10 minutes practicing sight words (until he/she has mastered the 4th grade list). These will be assessed every Friday... Owl Bucks will be fined when work is incomplete or planner is not signed...
- NOVEL: We will continue our novel study, The One and Only Ivan, by Katherine Applegate... As we read in class, they will reread to you at home ...this will increase reading fluency, and improve their comprehension.
- LANGUAGE/GRAMMAR: Students are responsible for completing two pages daily in their Abeka workbook to reinforce concepts previously taught in class.
- SPELLING: Students will receive spelling work on the first day of the week, and these are always due on the last day of the week. TESTS will also be on the last day of the week...They will have some class time to work on this, but they may have to complete work at home.
- PLEASE help me to encourage proper letter formation (manuscript)...I have noticed that a few students continue to write their letters going from the bottom up, and/or going in the opposite direction—this is a problem, since cursive letters always flow from the left to the right, making it extremely challenging for students who have not mastered manuscript letters... I will be assigning extra practice pages as needed...

# **Humanities**

The kids did some writing projects about the important people and dates of this time period. We have started the Texas Revolution. They are going to learn about so many important events and people during this time period. They are excited to learn more about the Alamo. I hope they come home with excitement to tell you what they have learned. We will culminate the Texas Revolution with a historical fiction writing piece.



# Math

## Ms. Jaya

#### Giraffes:

The Giraffes recently completed a unit on shapes, where they explored various 3D figures and learned to distinguish between a cube, rectangular prism, sphere, cylinder, and cone. They are now diving into a unit of measurements, focusing on understanding length and width, and comparing different units of measurement. Key concepts include identifying which objects are longer or shorter, taller or shorter, heavier or lighter, and using terms like "more" and "less" to describe quantities when making comparisons.

#### Pandas:

The Pandas are currently immersed in a geometry unit, where they are identifying various 2D and 3D shapes and counting their edges, vertices, and angles. They've explored foundational concepts such as points, lines, rays, line segments, and angles, along with understanding the relationships between parallel, perpendicular, and intersecting lines. The students have also been classifying different 2D shapes (triangles, quadrilaterals, pentagons, etc.) by counting their vertices and edges. Moving forward, they will continue working on calculating the area and perimeter of different polygons before transitioning to 3D shapes. Afterward, they'll begin a unit on measurements, focusing on units and systems of measurement, learning how to measure quantities using both standard units (meters, seconds, kilograms) and non-standard units (such as paper clips and pencils).

#### Lions:

The Lions recently completed a geometry unit, where they focused on identifying points, lines, rays, line segments, angles, and understanding the relationships between parallel, perpendicular, and intersecting lines. They explored different types of 2D shapes (triangles, quadrilaterals, pentagons, etc.), classifying them by counting vertices and edges. The students also practiced calculating the area and perimeter of polygons before advancing to 3D shapes. In this section, they learned to: Identify and name different 3D shapes and figures. Understand and describe the properties of these shapes. Recognize and compare angles (right angles, greater than, or less than a right angle). Sort shapes and figures based on their attributes. Identify congruent shapes and figures. Create pictures and models of shapes and figures. Next, the Lions will begin a unit on measurements, where they'll focus on understanding and applying standard units such as inches, feet, yards, centimeters, meters, liters, grams, and units of time (hours, minutes, seconds). Emphasis will be placed on converting between units within the same system, measuring length, weight, capacity, and time using appropriate tools, and solving real-world measurement problems.

# Math CONT.

#### **Tigers**

The Tigers recently completed a unit on Ratio, Proportion, and Probability. In this unit, they explored the fundamental concepts of ratios, learning to understand ratio language, represent ratios in different forms (a:b, a/b), identify equivalent ratios, use ratio tables, calculate unit rates, and apply ratio reasoning to solve real-world problems. They also worked on identifying similar and congruent figures, creating and interpreting scale drawings, and writing proportions for given scale measurements. Now, the students are diving into a unit on Percent. They are developing an understanding of percent as a part of a whole, converting between fractions, decimals, and percent's, finding the percent of a number, and calculating percentages in everyday situations, such as sales tax and discounts. This unit also reinforces concepts like ratios and unit rates, helping students make connections between these mathematical ideas.



# Science

On February 7, 2025, Periodic Table Day, we celebrated 154 years of the Periodic Table. National Periodic Table Day recognizes the publication of the first element table and honors scientific achievements in chemistry. American chemistry teacher David Steineker created the day to share his passion for chemistry and mapping the known elements. All students enjoyed learning the updated song of the elements. Lions and Tigers did a Periodic Table Scavenger Hunt while Pandas picked out their favorite element and made a fact cube with details about their chosen element.

All our Pinnacle Students turned National Inventors Day on February 11th into Inventors Month by using simple machines like pulleys, inclined planes, screws, wedges, and wheels/axles to create complex Rube Goldberg Machines! These "machines" take very simple tasks, like sharpening a pencil or eating a banana, and make them into chain reactions. Students took a group of ordinary objects and connected them with a bunch of simple machines in a weird but workable way.

According to Brains & Motion Education, building Rube Goldberg machines allows students to:

- Build creative contraptions that merge imagination and engineering.
- Learn fundamental physics principles like energy transfer, forces, and motion.
- Work through exciting challenges that encourage critical thinking and problem-solving.
