### Giraffes: 1

- •READING & SIGHT WORD LOGS: 2 more weeks! Please remember to sign both logs!
- Please help me reinforce the concept of STRETCHING out words... "Get your mouth ready to say the first SOUND, then STRETCH each sound until the word is done. Then say the word FAST!"
- ■READING: Guided Reading based on your individual child's instructional level
- WRITING...Each day, the Giraffes will write sentences about the story we are reading. I want to see them sounding & stretching out the words phonetically (also called "invented spelling"). I will be monitoring and working with each student to help them according to his or her educational needs.
- PHONICS & SOUNDS: Students are responsible for completing two pages daily in their Abeka workbook to reinforce concepts previously taught in class.
- •Please help me to encourage proper letter formations and forming/reading complete sentences. [abc AB]
- ◆Please be on the lookout for mandatory SUMMER READING assignments
- Please talk with me at morning drop off or dismissal if you are interested in setting up private tutoring for your child over the summer!

#### Pandas:

- READING & SIGHT WORD LOGS: Parents, please remember to sign BOTH logs DAILY M-Thurs. This confirms that your child has spent 20 minutes of reading & 10 minutes practicing sight words (until he/she has mastered the 4th grade list). These will be assessed every Friday... Owl Bucks will be fined when work is incomplete or planner is not signed...
- NOVEL: We will continue our novel study, The One and Only Ivan, by Katherine Applegate... As we read in class, they will reread to you at home ...this will increase reading fluency, and improve their comprehension.
- LANGUAGE/GRAMMAR: Students are responsible for completing two pages daily in their Abeka workbook to reinforce concepts previously taught in class.
- SPELLING: Students will receive spelling work on the first day of the week, and these are always due on the last day of the week. TESTS will also be on the last day of the week...They will have some class time to work on this, but they may have to complete work at home.
- PLEASE help me to encourage proper letter formation (manuscript)...I have noticed that a few students continue to write their letters going from the bottom up, and/or going in the opposite direction—this is a problem, since cursive letters always flow from the left to the right, making it extremely challenging for students who have not mastered manuscript letters... I will be assigning extra practice pages as needed...
- CURSIVE: We will continue learning one new lowercase cursive letter each day... I am so proud of their determination and effort!

# **Humanities**

# Mrs. Hughlett

I can't believe that we have made it to May! This is an exciting time of the year. We will be engaged in so many fun things.

**Giraffes:** In the Giraffe's class, we will continue with our literacy work and letter sound work, but we will add more emphasis on the writing component. We are going to do a mini book review. The students will read and then write about what they like and what they don't like about the book. They will enjoy this! It gives them ownership over what they are reading.

Pandas, Lions, and Tigers: We are coming to the end of our Texas History unit. This month we are going to cover the Civil War and Reconstruction of Texas. Texas is so rich in history and learning about what has molded our fine state into what it is today is very fascinating. I hope your children have been able to share some of their knowledge with you and if you are able to take some time this summer, I encourage you to take a trip to see some of the different regions of Texas, our state capitol, The Alamo or even some of the other Missions that are still standing and open to the public. They are amazing!



# Math

#### Ms. Jaya

#### Giraffes:

The Giraffes just wrapped up their Probability unit, exploring everyday examples to understand the ideas of "likely," "unlikely," "certain," and "impossible." They also practiced gathering data and showing what they found with objects, pictures, and picture graphs. Some students began using number lines for addition and subtraction, while others are about to dive into multiplication tables. We'll keep strengthening everyone's math-fact fluency as we move forward.

#### Pandas:

The Pandas have been diving into a unit on Probability and Statistics, where they've been learning key terms like "Certain," "Impossible," "Likely," and "Unlikely." They've practiced predicting outcomes, categorizing events, and conducting hands-on experiments like rolling dice and flipping coins. Students are also recording and interpreting their results using tally marks and simple tables. In addition, the class had fun with "Gallon Man," a creative activity where they colored and assembled a visual to help them understand liquid measurement and capacity. Moving forward, students will continue developing their problem-solving skills as they begin writing and solving expressions and equations. They'll soon apply their knowledge to more complex problems involving the order of operations.

#### Lions:

The Lions have just finished a Decimals unit, mastering tenths and hundredths, comparing and ordering values, and honing their estimation skills. Some students also delved into Probability, learning terms like "certain," "likely," "unlikely," and "impossible." They used real-world examples, fractions (e.g., a 1/2 chance of heads), and number-line models (0 to 1) to describe and compare the likelihood of different events. Next up, the Lions will extend their place-value understanding all the way to the billions and tackle addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division—both with and without decimals—while applying their skills to rich problem-solving challenges.

#### Tigers:

The Tigers recently wrapped up a unit on Percent, where they explored both Simple and Compound Interest, learning how to differentiate between them and calculate each. They are now diving into a unit on Linear Functions, focusing on identifying linear equations with two variables, finding the slope of a line, writing equations in slope-intercept form, and solving and graphing both linear equations and inequalities. Additionally, some of the Tigers are working through a unit on Expressions and Equations, where they're learning to write and evaluate algebraic expressions, solve equations and inequalities, apply the order of operations, and tackle real-world problem-solving scenarios.

# Science

## Mrs. Hozie

Every Tuesday, Mrs. Hozie holds a Science Show and Tell. This engaging activity allows students to share and display their scientific curiosities and knowledge.

This year, students at Pinnacle Prep have an array of opportunities to earn Owl Bucks. Each class maintains a bank managed by a rotating "banker" who oversees the wallets. Through this system, students learn valuable budgeting skills as they earn and save for desirable rewards, such as Treasure Chests, class parties, and the chance to be Teacher for a Day.

A number of Pinnacle students took part in the optional Owl Bucks Science Party. Participants were able to create vegetarian sugar cookie models of animal cells using candies as organelles. Additionally, they could construct electric circuit vehicles. It was a wonderful way to celebrate their hard work!

All our Pinnacle students learned about how germs are spread. We used a special non-toxic powder that glows brightly under ultraviolet light. The students unknowingly passed around an "infected organism." They then used an ultraviolet lamp to demonstrate how the "germs" transferred to their hands and faces.

Finally, the Pandas and Giraffes had an absolutely "Sea-sational" adventure at the Sea Life Aquarium! The vibrant underwater world was filled with excitement, wonder, and unforgettable moments!
